

The International Workshop “Archaeological Landscapes of Mesopotamia between Prehistory and the Islamic Period (ALaM): Formation, Transformation, Protection and Enhancement” presents the results of a PRIN 2015 project funded by the Italian Ministry of Education, University and Research. Under the denominator of common methodologies and objectives, ALaM combines the research activities of three innovative landscape archaeology projects conducted by the Universities of Udine, Milan, Turin, and Venice and the Institute of Technologies Applied to Cultural Heritage (National Research Council) in the regions of Dohuk and Erbil in the Autonomous Region of Iraqi Kurdistan and in the Kut area of Central Iraq. These regions had never been systematically explored and offer an extremely high potential for an integrated archaeological study of ancient landscapes.

The workshop discusses the results of the interdisciplinary research activities carried out by ALaM in these regions of Central Iraq and Iraqi Kurdistan with the aim of reconstructing the formation and evolution of their cultural and natural landscapes between the Palaeolithic and Islamic periods. The great archaeological heritage of these regions is seriously threatened (urban development, agricultural and industrial activities, vandalism, proximity to war zones devastated by the Islamic State). The workshop also illustrates the activities of ALaM aimed at guaranteeing in innovative ways the knowledge, documentation, protection and enhancement of the “endangered archives”, the archaeological sites and landscapes of this vast region threatened by neglect and war and to ensure the transmission of knowledge of them to future generations.
